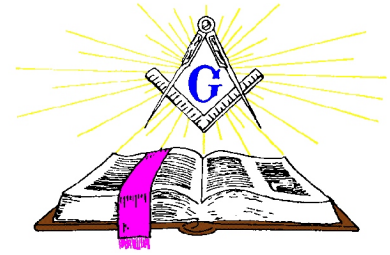

BOOK REVIEWS

At our meeting I encouraged members to submit short book reviews of those great Masonic books they have discovered, and I started this out by mentioning the new "Scottish Rite Ritual, Monitor and Guide" by Arturo de Hoyos. A bit pricey, but worth it for all who have an interest in the Rite. A huge, well researched and beautifully presented book.

PAPERS PRESENTED

Three very interesting papers were presented at the Londonderry meeting. The first was by our SW Stanley Schumacher: "Robert Livingston-Mason and Founding Father". Brother Stan took us on a walk through the first years of our Republic, illustrating how the principles of Freemasonry provided our country's foundational ideas. He also noted how and why "Ancient" Masonry came to typify our Fraternity in the U.S.

Brother Steve Farrington followed with "Freemasonry, the Scourge of Despots" which he said he threw together quickly for the occasion. This was a completely excellent paper highlighting the political aspects of our order, and how those men struggling for liberty and social freedom were, almost without exception in every country of the earth, Freemasons.

Steven Cosgrove, one of our newest members who hails from Rutland, spoke on "The mythology of Hiram", detailing the many facets of the Hiram legend throughout history. Fascinating!

Steve also brought with him an old 32° diploma which I recognized as belonging to the founding

father of Scottish Rite Masonry in Vermont! Steve had purchased it down in Boston, without knowing of its unique interest for Vermont Scottish Rite Masons, and just happened to bring it along. Talk about coincidence! I gave a short talk about this document, about Phineas Ballou, and how he was instrumental in the founding of the AASR here in Vermont.
