You joined because you saw in Masonry something of interest, something worth your while. It is still there. Let's share that insight and enthusiasm with each other, and with a new generation of Brothers.


WINTER MEETING IN ST. JAY

I looked forward to our meeting hosted by Passumpsic #27 in Saint Johnsbury, and I was not disappointed. Eating out at a diner around the corner from the lodge building worked out very well and was fun. At the dropping of the gavel I saw 22 Masons gracing the sidelines of this historic old lodge room. The many physical improvements were a joy to behold, especially for us who remembered how badly they were needed. Our group included a newly passed fellowcraft, so we opened on five for his benefit.

I think the presentations given were perhaps the best I have ever seen collected in one meeting. Steven Engel told of his discovery of the lodge room of Oriental #88 in a small upper room of the church in Montgomery. Long abandoned and extinct, this tiny lodge room created by veterans of the Civil War had collected dust and been forgotten until repairs to the church had brought it to light again. Steve showed us the columns of Jachin and Boaz from this lodge, quaintly turned and small enough for him to bring with him. His history and biographies of its members gave a great glimpse of early Vermont Masonic life.

This theme was continued by brother John Tester's presentation of early documents from Independence #10 in Orwell. He told how as a new secretary of the lodge he had explored the recesses of the ancient lodge desk and found packets of documents in manila envelopes. It took him three months of daily labor to open, unfold, decipher and archive these in acid free plastic envelopes. When he was done, he had over 800 documents going as far back as 1803 covering all aspects of the life of this historic Lodge. We set up a large dining table in the lodge room, and the documents he brought covered it. I granted liberty of the lodge so we all could examine these relics of our Masonic past. Truly fascinating!

Joe Netzel gave us our final talk, entitled "In whom do you put your trust?" This was a philosophical examination of the Masonic landmark of "Belief in a Supreme Being" and its relationship to those first kneeling at the altar of Freemasonry. Beautifully written and most thought provoking, Joe's presentation was followed by one of the best break out discussions I have heard in lodge in guite some time. I was once again struck with the guality of the members assembled, and feel lucky to have a small place amid such brothers. I want to thank the presenters and those who attended for the beauty and joy of another great meeting of the Vermont Lodge of Research.
